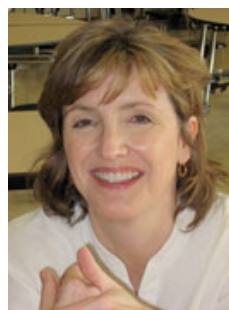
Language teachers often have lessons that revolve around culture: food, music, fashion, history, traditions, and sites

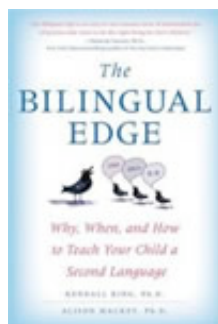
